Resurrection is the Heart of the Gospel (15:1-11)

Definition of the Gospel


• Predicted in the Old Testament (1-4)

• Attested to by eyewitnesses (5-11)

Resurrection of Christ Predicted in the Old Testament (15:1-4)

• Psalm 16:10

• Isaiah 53:10



Christ's Resurrection Attested to by Eyewitnesses (15:5-11)

- Cephas (5a)
- The twelve (5b)
- The five hundred (6)
- James (7a)
- The rest of the apostles (7b)
- Paul (8-11)



Seven Disastrous Consequences if there is no Resurrection (15:12-19)

- 1) Christ not raised (13, 16)
- 2) Preaching in vain (14a)
- 3) Faith in vain (14b, 17a)
- 4) Apostles are liars (15)
- 5) We are still in our sin (17b)
- 6) No hope for the dead in Christ (18)
- 7) We are pitiable (19)




2 Benefits of Christ's Resurrection (15:20-28)

- 1) Guarantees believer's resurrection (20-23)
- 2) Guarantees the Father's ultimate victory (24-28)

Order or Tagma (15:23)

- General: Christ's resurrection (1 Cor 15:23)
- Officer: Rapture (1 Thess 4:13-18)
- <u>Soldiers</u>: OT saints & Tribulation martyrs (Rev 20:4)
- <u>Captives</u>: Unsaved of all ages (Rev 20:5)



The Father's Ultimate Victory (15:24-28)

- Christ's resurrection (23a)
- Believer's resurrection (23b)
- Millennial kingdom (24b-25)
- Fulfillment of Psalm 8:6 (27)
- Christ returns kingdom to the Father (24a)
- Defeat of death / the Eternal State (26)
- The Father becomes head of all (28)




2 Negative Consequences If There is No Resurrection (15:29-34)

1) Futility of baptism for the dead (29)

- 2) Futility of self-sacrifice (30-32)
- Paul's concluding exhortation (33-34)
 - Separate from bad company (33)
 - Gain knowledge (34)

- Illustrations from nature (36-41)
 - Seeds (36-38)
 - Human and animal bodies (39-40)
 - Celestial bodies (41)

- Future body: spiritual, heavenly body proceeding from Christ

- Mystery (51a)
- A generation of Christians to be spared from death (51b)
- Instantaneous (52a)
- Last trump (52b)
- Preparation for eternity (50, 53)
- Victory over death (54-57)
- Positive impact upon daily life (58)



Exemption from Death (1 Cor 15:54-56)

- Enoch (Gen 5)
- Elijah (2 Kings 2)
- Christ (Acts 1:11; Rev 12:5)
- Philip (Acts 8)
- Paul (2 Cor 12)
- John (Rev 4:1-2)
- Two witnesses (Rev 11)
