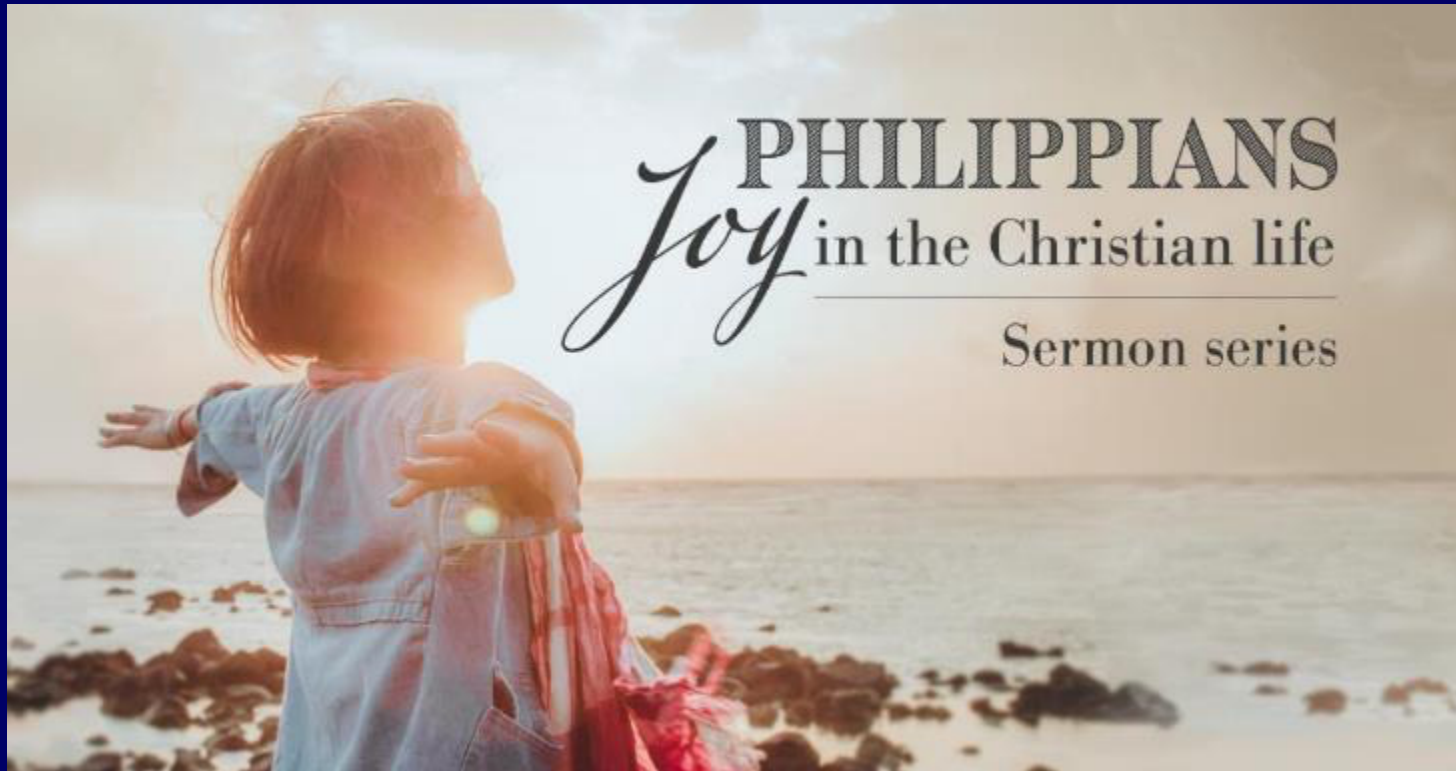

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# Philippians 3:8

“More than that, I count all things to be loss in view of the surpassing value of knowing [gnōsis] Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them but so that I may gain Christ.”



## Matthew 7:21-23

“Not everyone who says to Me, ‘Lord, Lord,’ will enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father who is in heaven *will enter*.<sup>22</sup> Many will say to Me on that day, ‘Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in Your name, and in Your name cast out demons, and in Your name perform many miracles?’<sup>23</sup> And then I will declare to them, ‘I never knew [ginōskō] you; DEPART FROM ME, YOU WHO PRACTICE LAWLESSNESS.’”

# Eight Reasons for Paul's Fleshly Confidence

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## “Believe” Defined

*pisteuō*...“to believe,” also “to be persuaded of,” and hence, “to place confidence in, to trust,” signifies, in this sense of the word, reliance upon, not mere credence. It is most frequent in the writings of the apostle John, especially the Gospel. He does not use the noun...Of the writers of the Gospels...uses of the verb...John ninety-nine.

“This vital newness of mind is a part of believing, after all, and therefore it may be and is used as a synonym for believing at times (cf. Acts 17:30; 20:21; 26:20; Rom. 2:4; 2Tim. 2:25; 2 Pet. 3:9). Repentance nevertheless cannot be added to believing as a condition of salvation, because upwards of 150 passages of Scripture condition salvation upon believing only (cf. John 3:16; Acts 16:31).”

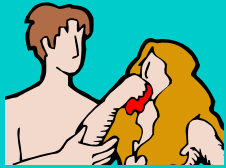

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# 1 Corinthians 15:20-23

“<sup>20</sup> But now Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who are asleep. <sup>21</sup>-For since by a man came death, by a man also came the resurrection of the dead. <sup>22</sup> For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ all will be made alive. <sup>23</sup> But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, after that those who are Christ’s at His coming.”

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# Philippians 3:14

“I press on toward the goal for the prize [*brabeion*] of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.”



# 1 Corinthians 9:24-27

“Do you not know that those who run in a race all run, but *only* one receives the prize [*brabeion*]? Run in such a way that you may win. <sup>25</sup> Everyone who competes in the games exercises self-control in all things. They then *do it* to receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable. <sup>26</sup> Therefore I run in such a way, as not without aim; I box in such a way, as not beating the air; <sup>27</sup> but I discipline my body and make it my slave, so that, after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified.”
