3 Phases of Salvation

- Justification: freedom from sin's penalty
- Sanctification: freedom from sin's power
- Glorification: freedom from sin's presence

Gal 6:1-10 Overview

A. To Sinning Christians (Gal 6:1)

- 1) Trespass-those caught in legalism
- 2) Spiritual-those who walk by the Spirit are to restore those caught in legalism
- 3) Restoration is to be done with gentleness



B. To Burdened Christians (Gal 6:2-5)

- 1) Bear one another's burdens (6:2)
- 2) Pride prevents burden sharing (6:3)



- 3) Testing ones own actions prevents pride (6:4)
- 4) The believer can test his own actions based upon his willingness to carry his expected load (6:5)



C. To Teachers (Gal 6:6-9)

- 1) Responsibility of all believers to financially support the teaching of God's Word (6:6)
- 2) Law of sowing and reaping (6:7)
- 3) Application of the law of sowing and reaping to




