

- Father of Judas (not Iscariot)
- The son of Alphaeus
- The son of Zebedee and brother of John
- The half brother of Christ

Turn	5:19-20	15:19
Being called by God's name	2:7	15:17

- Does not identify himself as Christ's brother
- Greek is too good
- Lack of unanimous acceptance in the early church

- Initial unbelief (John 7:5)
- One of the first to receive word of Christ's resurrection (John 20:17)
- Post resurrection ministry (Acts 1:14)
- Leader of Jerusalem church (Acts 15)
- Married (1 Cor 9:5)
- Camel knees
- James the Just
- Martyrdom




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Audience

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Acts 8:3-4; 11:19

"3 But Saul began ravaging the church, entering house after house, and dragging off men and women, he would put them in prison. 4 Therefore, those who had been scattered went about preaching the word...¹⁹ So then those who were scattered because of the persecution that occurred in connection with Stephen made their way to Phoenicia and Cyprus and Antioch, speaking the word to no one except to Jews alone."

"But when Hyrcanus was brought into Parthia the king Phraates treated him after a very gentle manner, as having already learned of what an illustrious family he was; on which account he set him free from his bonds, and gave him a habitation at Babylon, where there were Jews in great numbers. These Jews honored Hyrcanus as their high priest and king, as did all the Jewish nation that dwelt as far as **Euphrates**; which respect was very much to his satisfaction..."

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


Place of Writing

Map of Ancient Near East





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

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


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

- Concerned with practical righteousness



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
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
Deuteronomy 28:49-50



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
